- (i) USGA Rules govern play except as modified and include the local provisions of Hole 14A, which must be played and counted toward the score of any and all rounds completed.
- (ii) At any given time during play on Hole 16 players may not venture closer to the hole than the point at which their ball rests until it is moved forward by the legal stroke of a club.
- (iii) All players must carry 40 balls and may at their option carry one extra club in the event another becomes lost or entangled within *Rhus diversilobia*.
- (iv) There are no out-of-bounds.
- (v) The helicopter pad adjacent to No. 9 green is considered an immovable obstruction.
- (vi) A single red signal flare shall represent suspension of play; all players must mark balls and proceed to the nearest landing zone or boat dock.
- (vii) All guests must be accompanied by a member in good standing.
